





Community Improvements and Updates

Rowland Heights Named Best and Affordable Place to Raise Children in California



An annual survey by Bloomberg Businessweek Magazine named Rowland Heights as California's top place to raise children. The magazine annually researches small middle income communities nationwide with populations under 50,000 that qualify as the most affordable place to raise a family. Also taken into consideration is education, job growth, crime statistics, air quality, ethnic diversity, and access to surrounding county parks and other recreational facilities. Bloomberg and Businessweek Magazine used 2010 data from a real estate information and technology company and evaluated 5,418 places in the United States. The magazine highlights other cities nationwide selected as top locations to raise a family.



Rowland Heights Community Center

Plans are underway to build a new community center specifically for the residents of Rowland Heights. The new County facility will be designed to provide additional recreation and community resources for the whole family!



A Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) was formed and is made up of over 31 representatives from 17 organizations in Rowland Heights. The CAC is assisting the County's development team to design a facility that would offer a variety of programs for all ages and cultures reflecting the diversity of Rowland Heights. Over 200 community residents participated in a visioning meeting and voted on what type of programs and facilities they would like to see at the new Community Center.

The Hollywood Bowl is a historic venue that has seating capacity for 18,000 but only has parking for 2,800 vehicles. 

Public Health Rolls Out Letter Grades for Mobile Food Facilities



Since 1998, LA County residents have become familiar with the letter grade seen in restaurant windows. The letter grade system has offered assurances that restaurants have been carefully inspected by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health.

Based on the success of the Restaurant Grading Program, the Board of Supervisors passed an ordinance in October 2010 that now requires the grading program to be extended to mobile food facilities, or “restaurants on wheels,” such as food trucks and hot dog carts. This program will take several months to implement and is currently underway. The ordinance applies to all mobile food facilities that conduct business in the City of Los Angeles, Santa Monica, and unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. Several other cities have inquired about the ordinance and are considering it for adoption as well.

Residents can be assured that their risk of getting sick from food borne illness is significantly diminished through routine inspections that use rigorous food safety standards, including employee hygiene, clean facilities and equipment, and proper food storage temperatures.


Cooling Centers

Infants, the elderly and people with mental or physical illnesses are at a greater risk for heat-related illness. Check regularly on them and if possible, make sure they stay in air-conditioned locations. Nearby Cooling Centers are located at Pathfinder Park and Rowland Heights Library (the addresses can be found on the back cover). Protect Your Family from Whooping Cough (Pertussis)

If you live with an infant make sure to be vaccinated against pertussis. Infants under 1 year of age are at highest risk for developing complications.



There were more pertussis cases reported in California in 2010 than in any other year since 1947. Infants are most likely to contract the disease from a sibling, mother, or father. Typical symptoms in children include intense coughing, often accompanied by a whooping sound, and post-cough vomiting.

Children should receive:

- 4 DTaP vaccinations by 18 months of age, beginning at 2 months of age.
- A DTaP booster at ages 4-6.
- A Tdap booster at 11-12 years.

All teens and adults should receive a Tdap booster, especially if they live in a household with an infant. Those who do not have a regular doctor or insurance coverage for vaccines can dial **2-1-1**, or visit www.publichealth.lacounty.gov/ip to obtain referrals for immunizations at no charge or at a reduced charge.

No Shot, No School

New Pertussis Booster School Requirement Takes Effect

A new California requirement takes effect July 1, 2011 for all 7th through 12th graders in public and private schools. The pertussis booster (Tdap) vaccine must be received before admission will be allowed for the 2011-2012 school year.

Parents are encouraged to have their adolescent children vaccinated at their regular health care provider’s office. Childhood Exercise

Childhood obesity is a serious crisis for Los Angeles County, as more than one in five students in the fifth, seventh, and ninth grades are considered obese. Children who eat too much junk food and who do not get enough physical activity are at risk of serious problems, such as low self-esteem, depression, asthma, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, liver problems, and breathing problems during sleep.

While kids have a break from school, it could be tempting to let them sit at home in front of a television or video game console. But this is a great time for children to learn the positive benefits of play. Exercise can help prevent childhood and adult obesity.

Coping with Coyotes

Coyotes are often sighted in Rowland Heights. The highly adaptable coyote is flourishing in populated areas, mostly because of the easy access to food and water. Coyotes can survive on whatever food is available, become accustomed to the sight and sounds of humans and are mainly active at night and twilight. There are several steps you can take to discourage coyote visits on your property.



- Never leave small children unattended in areas where coyotes are known to be, even in your yard.
- Keep small pets indoors. Some coyotes hunt cats in residential areas. Keep pet food indoors, or promptly remove dishes when pets complete their meal outside.
- Clear brush and dense weeds from around your property. This deprives rodents of shelter, and reduces cover for coyotes who search for rodents for food.
- Maintain trash cans with secure lids that will not open if tipped over by large animals. Do not leave filled plastic trash bags out at night. Try and avoid putting out your trash the night before pick-up. Put trash out in the morning to prevent coyotes from scavenging during the evening.
- Pick up fallen fruit and cover compost piles.
- Put away bird feeders at night to avoid attracting rodents and other coyote prey.
- Do not feed or provide water for coyotes or other wild life. It is against the law to feed coyotes.



Learn To Live With Africanized Honey Bees (AHB)

Emergencies: Dial 9-1-1

It's bee swarming season again! Today, the wild bees you observe swarming around and establishing colonies at your home or trees are most probably Africanized. The AHB is closely related to the European honey bee used in agriculture for crop pollination. The AHB respond quickly and sting in large numbers. They can sense a threat from people, animals, and vibrations from power equipment 50 feet or more from the nest, and pursue an enemy 1/4 mile or more. AHB swarm frequently to establish new nests in small cavities and sheltered areas; like holes and cavities in buildings, garages, sheds, low decks, fences, trees and shrubs.

Bee proofing your home:

- Inspect outside walls and eaves of home and outbuildings.
- Seal openings larger than 1/8" in walls, around chimneys and plumbing.
- Install fine screens over tops of rainspouts, vents, and openings in utility boxes.

Here Are General Precautions:

- Listen for buzzing, indicating a nest or swarm of bees.
- Examine work area before using lawn mowers, weed cutters, and blowers.
- Be alert when participating in all outdoor sports and activities.
- Examine areas before tying up horses or livestock.
- Teach children to be cautious and respectful of all bees.
- Develop a safety plan for your home and yard.
- **Don't disturb a nest or swarm – contact a licensed pest control company.**

If attacked by bees, leave the area quickly and find shelter in building or car.

What to do If Stung By Bees?

- Go quickly to a safe area.
- Remove stinger as soon as possible.
- Don't squeeze stinger; pressure will release more venom.
- Scrape stinger out with fingernail, knife blade or credit card.
- Wash sting area with soap and water like any other wound.
- Apply ice pack for a few minutes to relieve pain and swelling.
- Seek medical attention if breathing is troubled, if stung numerous times or if allergic to bee sting.

Under California law, a surrendering adult has the right to reclaim the child within 14 days of the surrender and allows for the anonymous surrender of a infant born within 72 hours to a hospital or fire station. Soon after the baby was surrendered at the station, paramedics from Station 26 arrived to transport the baby boy to Queen of the Valley Hospital for more medical tests. The baby was placed in a foster home while the adoption process gets underway.

Code Enforcement Section

You may think of code enforcement cases as fences that are too high or junk in a neighbor's yard, but cases also involve children living in filth with a parent that is a hoarder, dogs locked in a cage with no water, or an elderly veteran living in a trailer on vacant land without income. All of these are actual code enforcement stories.

The Code Enforcement Section prosecutes zoning and building code violations in the unincorporated areas and is made up of four Deputy District Attorneys (DDAs) and fifteen Investigators (DAIs).

DAIs offer security and investigative assistance to inspectors when they visit properties and with the Nuisance Abatement Teams (NATs). NATs are made up of building, zoning, property rehabilitation, and public health inspectors who inspect the more serious violations and dangerous properties. Often they are joined by Animal Control, Fire and the Department of Child Protective Services and are an effective way to improve the quality of life for the residents of these neighborhoods. Know Your Rights When you are Approached for House Number Curb Painting

Before you say "yes" to any solicitor who wants to paint your house number and a logo on the curb in front of your house, be aware of the facts:

- The County does not employ anyone to paint house numbers on curbs.
- You cannot be charged, however, you can volunteer to give a monetary donation.
- Legally, you are not obligated to have your house number on the curb. However, the Fire Department recommends that your address is clearly marked. If your house is not visible from the street, you may post a sign next to your driveway.
- The person requesting to paint your curb must obtain and carry an Encroachment Permit from Public Works.
- The property owner's permission must be obtained before painting the house number.
- Logos painted on the curb are not permitted in the unincorporated area (such as flags, symbols and insignias).
- The solicitor must provide you with a copy of the curb painting guidelines and obtain your signature indicating you understand and have given permission to paint your curb.

Please note again that a donation is not required in exchange for this service. 
